The following application is submitted by Chesterfield County, in partnership with Powhatan County, which borders Chesterfield County to the west, Colonial Heights, which borders the county to the south, and Petersburg, which is directly south of the county on the I-95 corridor. Chesterfield County and Powhatan County are within the same health district; all four communities fall within the Region 4 Department of Behavioral Health and Health and Developmental Services Region. The proposed project combines an existing project/effort enhancement with new components. The requested term is 5 years.

This project leverages the prior success of Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) which began in Chesterfield in 2014. The original goal of MIH was to work with frequent utilizers of the 911 system to decrease their need to utilize 911 for non-emergency reasons. Since 2018, Chesterfield County has embedded Certified Peer Recovery Specialists (CPRS) within the county's MIH Unit to respond to individuals following an overdose event. The CPRS provides a direct link for individuals to recovery support and treatment services within the community. A significant component of the proposed project will expand mobile outreach within the region.

c. Describe the objectives of this project.

Objective 1. Support mobile units that offer or provide referrals to harm reduction services, treatment, recovery supports, health care, or other appropriate services to persons that use opioids or persons with an opioid use disorder and any co-occurring substance use disorder/mental health conditions in all four communities.

Under the current project, we will expand upon the mobile outreach approach to reduce barriers and serve diverse areas within the four partner communities. Four vans will be purchased, one for each jurisdiction. Each jurisdiction will have its own mobile outreach team staffed with a trained opioid outreach coordinator and a CPRS. The mobile outreach teams may expand the post-overdose response to include other approaches that target high-risk and vulnerable populations. The primary goal of the mobile outreach teams is to provide comprehensive wrap-around services to individuals needing recovery support services, including access to certified recovery housing, transportation, job placement/training, connections to treatment services, or access to harm reduction services. We anticipate 70% of the individuals served will be diagnosed with an opioid use disorder or a co-occurring disorder. The balance will serve individuals with a substance use and/or co-occurring disorder.

Objective 2: Add Colonial Heights to the existing Opioid and Heroin Prevention Task Force

Substance Abuse Free Environment, Inc. (SAFE), which operates the Chesterfield Opioid and Heroin Prevention Task Force, will expand the current task force to serve Colonial Heights. The task force develops community partnerships and expands substance use prevention efforts to all sectors of the community. The task force has partnered with local law enforcement to create an opioid and heroin treatment resource card. Over 5,000 of these cards have been distributed throughout the community. The card lists the names and phone numbers of treatment and recovery resources. Under the proposed project, these efforts will be expanded to include Colonial Heights.

Objective 3: Expand community-based naloxone distribution and harm reduction services in all four communities.

Given the strong evidence behind scaling up the availability of naloxone within the community, we will facilitate community-based distribution directly to persons at risk for opioid overdose, friends and families of people who use drugs, first responders, and bystanders who wish to carry naloxone. We will expand community-based distribution of naloxone and other harm reduction services (e.g., fentanyl test strips, needles, syringes) by purchasing supplies in bulk at a reduced per-kit cost. Once purchased, we will work with county or city agencies and community-based organizations with high contact/established trust with persons at high risk for an opioid overdose to distribute these supplies within the four communities. Priority distribution "hot spot" areas include motels, jails, libraries, churches, schools, and emergency departments. We will also supply naloxone to first responders in all four jurisdictions, as needed, and provide updated or ongoing training upon request.

d. How was the need determined, and how does that need relate to abatement?

The need for increased access to naloxone, harm reduction services, recovery support services, and prevention services (all abatement-related services) has been established using fatal and non-fatal overdose data. This data comes from the Virginia Department of Health. In 2021, the statewide unintentional overdose death rate per 100,000 residents was 30.5 for all drug-related overdose deaths. Chesterfield County and Petersburg were above the state average at 35.7 deaths per 100,000 residents and 137.9 deaths per 100,000, respectively, and Colonial Heights and Powhatan were just below the state average, as shown in *Table 1*. Additional data documenting the need is provided in *Attachment C*.

e. Who are the targeted beneficiaries, and how many persons are expected to participate per year?

The primary target population for the proposed project is vulnerable groups of people who reside in Chesterfield, Colonial Heights, Powhatan, or Petersburg who use drugs. These include people who: 1, Have experienced a drug overdose or are at risk for a drug overdose; 2. Have co-occurring substance use disorder and behavioral health needs; 3. Face structural vulnerabilities, like low socioeconomic status, housing insecurity, lack of medical insurance; 4. Have had criminal justice involvement; and/or 5. Are pregnant or postpartum.

For our prevention work, the target audience is youth at risk for opioid use and their family members/loved ones

The total number to be served is 4,185. A breakdown of the projected numbers to be served is below:

Peer recovery support services: 370 individuals per year
Naloxone distribution/harm reduction services: 2,500 individuals per year
Recovery housing/recovery support services/Treatment services: 565 individuals per year
Expanded SAFE Opioid and Heroin Prevention Taskforce to Include Colonial Heights: 750 individuals per year

Relationship building and collaboration have been key to the underlying success of the current mobile integrated health program. In the expanded project, we will continue to work closely with government organizations working with vulnerable populations, including local hospitals, Fire/EMS, the courts, public defenders, social services, law enforcement, community corrections, drug court, and local jails. We anticipate the organizations noted will refer individuals to the mobile outreach team, distribute naloxone or other harm reduction services through their agencies, or request peer recovery support services or recovery housing for their clients/patients.

We intend to award approximately 39% of the budget (\$647,471) in a competitive grant or bid process to non-profit community-based providers post-award for recovery support services. We will be soliciting community-based providers for certified recovery housing, certified peer recovery support services, and other wrap-around services. We will also purchase naloxone, drug disposal supplies, safe storage supplies, and vehicles through vendor contracts.

For our prevention work, we will partner with Substance Abuse Free Environment, Inc. (SAFE), a 501c 3 created as the local substance abuse prevention coalition by the Chesterfield County Drug and Alcohol Abuse Task Force in 1999. SAFE will receive approximately \$92,000 to expand the existing Opioid and Heroin Prevention Taskforce work to include Colonial Heights.
