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The goal of the program is to establish first responder and peer partnerships, increase peer engagement with emergency departments, and provide access to peer recovery services at
first opportunity following a substance use incident to increase engagement and access to substance use and Medication Assisted Treatment through engagement with peer recovery
services.

d. How was the need determined and how does that need relate to abatement?

The overdose rate in the 5 counties (Rappahannock, Fauquier, Culpeper, Orange, Madison) are some of the highest in the state of Virginia with 62 overdoses per 10k in population. Highest OD rates are in Orange and Culpeper County. Then Fauquier, Madison, and Rappahannock. 956 Overdoses in the 5 county area that resulted in an ER visit in 2021 Culpeper 384, Fauquier 492, Rappahannock 12, Madison 68, and Orange 362. This "rapid response" service from certified peers will allow quicker response and more engagement to services which should over time decrease the number of overdose deaths.

e. Who are the targeted beneficiaries, and how many persons are expected to participate per year?

Overdose Response services will be available to any Culpeper, Fauquier, Madison, Orange, and Rappahannock community members 18 and older who have experienced challenges with opioids. Peer recovery services offer one-on-one individual support; recovery, resiliency, and wellness planning; transitional support to and from residential treatment; access to community recovery groups, i.e., Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Medication Assisted Recovery Anonymous, or Celebrate Recovery; evidenced based recovery models to include, Wellness Recovery Action Plan, SMART Recovery, and Recovery Pathways; additional support during the acquisition of Medication Assisted Recovery Treatment. It is estimated that 111 adults will be connected with services by peer recovery specialists in year 1.

Scope of Services

Peer recovery services offer one-on-one individual support; recovery, resiliency, and wellness planning; transitional support to and from residential treatment; access to community recovery groups, i.e., Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Medication Assisted Recovery Anonymous, or Celebrate Recovery; evidenced based recovery models to include, Wellness Recovery Action Plan, SMART Recovery, and Recovery Pathways; additional support during the acquisition of Medication Assisted Recovery Treatment.

RRCS Staffing Needs

To provide the proposed services, RRCS will employ one certified peer recovery specialist team lead, two full time certified peer recovery specialists, peer recovery specialists in mentorship, or peer supporters requiring training and mentorship; maintain a lease on two fleet sedans to facilitate response; and initial equipment startup costs.

WHEREAS, the cities and/or counties listed below have committed to work together to develop and jointly submit an application for regional cooperative partnership funding from the OAA; and

WHEREAS, at least two of the cities and/or counties listed below are located within the same region of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services; and

WHEREAS, the cities and/or counties and other organizations listed below agree they will execute a legally binding agreement formalizing the cooperating partnership if the application for financial assistance is approved; and

WHEREAS, the cities and/or counties and other organizations listed below agree that <u>Culpeper County</u> will serve as the fiscal agent for the cooperative partnership if it is awarded; and

WHEREAS, the cities and/or counties and other organizations listed below seek a total of <u>two hundred and fifty-three thousand</u>, three hundred and eighty-two dollars (\$253,382) in grant funding from the OAA for Fiscal Year 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the cities and/or counties and other organizations listed below hereby authorize <u>Culpeper County</u> to execute the cooperative partnership grant application to the Virginia Opioid Abatement Authority and to execute all documents in connection therewith.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

between

Rappahannock Rapidan Community Services Board And

Culpeper, Fauquier, Madison, Orange, and Rappahannock Counties

The parties to this Cooperative Agreement (the "Agreement") are:

Rappahannock-Rapidan Community Services (RRCS) and Culpeper County, Fauquier County, Madison County, and Orange County collectively referred to as the Partner Entities.

WHEREAS, RRCS seeks to establish a Peer Response Unit. This program will provide first responder and peer partnerships, increase peer engagement with emergency departments, and provide access to peer recovery services at first opportunity following a substance use incident to increase engagement and access to substance use and Medication Assisted Treatment through engagement with peer recovery services.

WHEREAS, in today's reality law enforcement is often tasked with providing these services to our community, often to the same individuals repeatedly. The Co-Responder model offers a different approach. The Co-Responder forms relationships, develops trust and helps meet individual needs with those members of our community most at risk of overdose. This relationship forms the foundation that opens the door to treatment and other support services. The approach of partnering a non-law enforcement professional into community response has been implemented in a variety of communities around the country to very positive results.

I. Specifics: RRCS will employ one certified peer recovery specialist team lead, two full time certified peer recovery specialists, peer recovery specialists in mentorship, or peer supporters requiring training and mentorship; maintain a lease on two fleet sedans to facilitate response; and initial equipment startup costs.

RRCS responsibilities Include:

- Peer recovery services offer one-on-one individual support;
- Recovery, resiliency, and wellness planning;
- Transitional support to and from residential treatment;
- Access to community recovery groups, i.e., Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Medication Assisted Recovery Anonymous, or Celebrate Recovery;
- Evidenced based recovery models to include, Wellness Recovery Action Plan, SMART Recovery, and Recovery Pathways;
- Additional support during the acquisition of Medication Assisted Recovery Treatment.
- II. Amendment or Termination: The Partner Entities agree to meet annually to discuss any necessary modifications to this Agreement. No amendment shall become effective unless reduced to writing signed by each of the Partner Entities.

In the event that any Partner Entity desires to terminate its participation in the Peer Response program, that Partner Agency shall provide the other Partner Agencies with 30 days prior to written notice. The remaining Partner Agencies shall meet to determine whether to continue to participation in the Peer Response program or to terminate the program.

- III. Term: This Agreement shall become effective upon execution by all Partner Entities and shall be in effect for an initial term of one year.
- IV. Confidentiality: The Partner Entities and their agents, servants and employees shall comply with federal, state and local laws and regulations relating to confidentiality, particularly the confidentiality of protected health information.
- V. Interpretation: Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted in such a manner that the interpretation would hinder or impede any Partner Entities in enforcing the laws, rules and regulations of the Commonwealth of Virginia or jurisdictions within this region.
