b.	Provide a brief narrative description of the proposed project including the requested term (1-5 years).
	The proposed project will divert individuals with MHD's and SUMHD's from arrest and hospitalization. The region's crisis co-response unit will be an effective and efficient way to enhance support for individuals with MHD's and SUMHD's in order to prevent re-hospitalization and re-incarceration. The CRU currently serves both Harrisonburg and Rockingham County.
	More than half of referrals (58.2%) in 2021-22 were for individuals residing in Harrisonburg, which is reflective of the proportion of calls for service in the region (57.6%), though not of the city population, which comprises just 38.2% of the service area. Of note, 2.3% of those served were active military service members and 4.5% were veterans. Additionally, 3.6% spoke English as a Second Language. A majority (63.5%) of those served by CRU had a previous mental health diagnosis, 40.7% were enrolled in mental health services at the time of assessment. 42.1% had been prescribed medication, although just 32% were taking their prescribed medication.
	In 2019, a JMHCP grant allowed RHJMHC to expand from a part-time team to a full-time co-response unit (CRU), consisting of a certified mental health clinician and a law enforcement officer who provide support to first responders and individual follow-up, including wellness checks and emergency case management. Additionally, the project created a specialized program for female offenders with MHDs/SUMHDs that offers expanded treatment, supervision, and residential support. As a specific response to opioid abatement, the CRU will expand screening and tracking for substance use (including opioid use) and distribute material on treatment and harm reduction outreach efforts (e.g., medically assisted treatment (MAT), Naloxone, fentanyl test strips, etc.).

c. Describe the objectives of this project

The projects objectives include: 1) Provide funding and training for first responders to participate in pre-arrest diversion programs, post-overdose response teams, or similar strategies that connect at-risk individuals to behavioral health services and supports; 2) Provide treatment and recovery support services; 3) Provide comprehensive wrap-around services to individuals with OUD, including housing transportation, job placement/training, and childcare; and 4) Support mobile intervention, treatment, and recovery services, offered by qualified professionals and service providers, such as peer recovery coaches for persons with OUD and any co-occuring SUD/MH conditions and for persons who have experienced an opioid overdose; 5) Expand harm prevention outreach efforts with distribution of Naloxene and Fentanyl test strips to at-risk individuals.

d. How was the need determined and how does that need relate to abatement?

A recent analysis of 911 calls showed that mental health-related calls for service (MH CFS) have increased by 10% over the past three years, from 2,510 unique CFS in 2019-20 to 3,040 in 2021-22. Rural townships in the county experienced the greatest growth, with an increase of 47.6%. Over two-thirds of calls (68.9%) were motivated primarily by mental health concerns, in which no additional law enforcement issues were noted by dispatch (e.g., suspicious or disorderly contact, weapons, drugs and alcohol, etc.). MH CFS include mental health calls (32.4%), suicide threats or attempts (16.2%), magistrate-issued emergency custody orders (ECO) and temporary detention orders (TDO) (11.5%), and welfare checks (8.5%). The increase in MH calls surpassed population growth in the region (US Census, n.d.). In addition, in 2020-21, HRCSB Emergency Services fielded more than 1,100 emergency crisis calls, the area's co-response unit (CRU) recorded more than 630 follow-up visits and wellness checks, and nearly 500 people were hospitalized for mental health.

There is a high prevalence of mental illness among individuals with opioid use disorders (OUD), increasing their risk of engagement with the criminal justice system. Recent research estimates that among individuals with OUD, 64.3% reported mental illness in the previous year, while 26.9% had a serious mental illness (SMI) (Jones & McCance-Katz, 2019). Limited treatment options and over reliance on the criminal justice system have resulted in disproportionate rates of incarcerations among individuals with OUD and MHDs. For example, a recent report by the Virginia State Compensation Board (2022) on mental illness in ocal and regional jails revealed that in June 2022, more than two thirds (78.8%) of the 679 inmates at Middle River Regional Jail (MRRJ) had been diagnosed with mental illness, with 319 identified as having a serious mental illness (SMI).

In addition, lack of follow-up care and connections to treatment contribute to higher rates of overdose, suicide, recidivism and continued capacity constraint on the community MH crisis response. RHJMHC must evolve to meet changing community needs and to develop comprehensive systems-level solutions. The RHJMHC advisory committee (see attached RHJMHC Management Structure) has identified several gaps that need to be addressed to strengthen collaboration between law enforcement and behavioral health, develop effective and efficient responses to individuals with SUMHDs.

e. Who are the targeted beneficiaries, and how many persons are expected to participate per year?

While the overall target population for RHJMHC is individuals with mental illness or co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse (MI/CMISA), each of the CRU programmatic components has specific criteria for eligibility. In order to determine program eligibility, once an individual is referred to CRU via a request for First Responder Support or Wellness Check, the CRU clinician screens them using the Field Assessment to determine whether they present with a MI/CMISA. In order to determine eligibility for further CRU services. Eligibility is as follows:

- _First Responder Support: Individuals presenting with a serious MI or CMISA, as identified by emergency dispatch (i.e., a 911 call) or by first responders when they arrive on the scene.
- _..Wellness Checks: Individuals with MI/CMISA who have been referred to CRU for a wellness check directly to the Project Coordinator or by the Harrisonburg Rockingham Community Services Board (HRCSB) Emergency Services Supervisor, via HRCSB staff, law enforcement, the hospital, and other community organizations.
- Short-Term Follow-Up: Individuals referred to CRU for a wellness check and who CRU determines in need of additional follow-up but do not qualify for or are not interested in HRCSB case management services.
- _Specialized Services for Female Offenders: Women with MI/CMISA who have been assessed as moderate to high risk/high need at any point in the sequential intercept, including 1) women awaiting sentencing (Intercept 2); 2) women released from ail/prison in District 39 (Intercept 4); and 3) women currently under District 39 supervision (Intercept 5).
