Utilizing this two-part approach, participants will enhance their knowledge, confidence, and competence to recognize signs of an opioid use disorder, provide a skilled intervention for overdose, as well as the steps to take to make their community safer and more supportive.

GOAL 1: Increase the capacity of school personnel, emergency responders, law enforcement, parents and caregivers, and members of the recovery community to recognize signs and symptoms of an opioid use disorder, and then refer individuals to appropriate professional help.

Objective 1.3: By December 30, 2023, according to pre/post and quarterly follow-up surveys, at least 80% of participants will report an increase in making referrals to any behavioral health service provider.

Objective 1.4: By December 30, 2023, upon completion of the training, at least 80% of evidence-based training participants will agree or strongly agree that they recognize the signs that someone may be dealing with a behavioral health problem and/or substance use challenge or crisis.

Objective 1.5: By December 30, 2023, upon completion of the training, at least 80% of individuals will increase their community connections and support systems.

g. Need Cont.

The goal and objectives listed above were determined based on the selected evidence-based practices (EBPs). The EBPs were chosen based on the needs of the local population, which is characterized by significant numbers of individuals with high rates of substance use and co-occurrence of traumatic experiences for the individuals seeking our services. According to the office of the Chief Medical Examiner, the MRCS service area is more than double the state rate of prescription drug overdoses. Also, the Forensic Science Drug Cases show that the service area ranks fourth in the state for having the highest rate of cases for prescription drugs/opioids.

Through our needs assessment, stakeholders also identified the greatest need to identify signs and symptoms of behavioral health disorders and how to refer individuals without re-traumatization. The possibility of re-traumatization occurs when providers are not knowledgeable and skilled in these areas; therefore, we utilized the Strategic Prevention Framework to identify the EBPs best suited to our community. The selected EBPs remove the fear and hesitation from starting conversations about behavioral health and opioid use disorders by improving understanding and providing an action plan that teaches people to safely and responsibly identify and address a potential mental illness or substance use disorder. When more people are equipped with the tools needed to start a dialogue, they can better identify resources and support, allowing more people to get the help they need. Because of the outcomes from our needs assessment, we will continue to prevent opioid use disorders, and plan to implement the two community awareness events with REVIVE! training as evidence-based strategies according to the abatement guidelines.

1. A description of your program and how does the project relate to abatement?

Mount Rogers Community Services (MRCS) is dedicated to improving the quality of life for individuals with mental health and substance use disorder intervention needs. Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have seen an exponential increase in the number of individuals and families seeking behavioral health services, serving 8,890 individuals in 2021, and 9,317 in 2022. Within this increase in services, we also see an increase in individuals with opioid use disorders, indicating a higher level of need throughout the community for abatement programs.

To provide programs for opioid use disorders, MRCS proposes increasing Naloxone training and distribution opportunities in the city of Galax. Training community members in REVIVE! supports efforts to prevent or reduce overdose deaths. To achieve this objective, MRCS Prevention Services will also implement evidence-based programs, practices, and strategies to shift community norms, change individuals' perceptions and behaviors, and train community members to identify signs and symptoms of behavioral health disorders. This evidence-based strategy includes the implementation of two community awareness events in the city of Galax to address the stigma. These awareness events include stations, activities, community booths and resources, guest speakers, and opportunities for connection to increase knowledge and reduce stigma. The stigma of mental health and substance use issues continues to be a barrier to people seeking service and support. When we address stigma, we build capacity in the community, which helps to prevent the misuse of opioids.

2. Support that the program is evidence-based

As we continue to build capacity in the community, we will continue to provide quality prevention services, programs, and activities that involve people, families, communities, and systems working together to promote their strengths and potential to increase the development of positive life skills and promote physical and mental wellness. The emphasis is on enhancing protective factors and reducing risk factors at the individual, peer, family, school, and community levels. The Prevention Services program offers an array of evidence-based programs that utilize the six federal Center for Substance Abuse Prevention strategies to meet the program's goal of providing a proactive environment. These strategies empower individuals, families, communities, and systems to meet the challenges of life's events and transitions by creating and implementing conditions that promote healthy behaviors and lifestyles.

In order to provide these services, MRCS utilizes the Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF). The Strategic Prevention Framework is an evidence-based practice. It is a five-step process that assists communities, coalitions, and agencies in identifying community issues, available resources, gaps in services, and selecting interventions that address the unique needs of that community. The SPF process focuses on using data and building capacity within each community to have an impact on the consequences of mental health and substance use disorders.

To maximize this capacity-building approach, MRCS refers to the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) researched and identified evidence-based practices and strategies to implement targeted opioid prevention efforts. According to this list of approved evidence-based strategies, MRCS will heighten community awareness and

education via targeted messaging at the two community awareness events in Galax, including REVIVE! training.

Similarly, in Virginia, the evidence-based program for Naloxone training is REVIVE!. This program, developed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, provides training on recognizing and responding to an opioid overdose emergency using naloxone. Naloxone is a prescription medicine that reverses opioid overdoses. It works by temporarily blocking the effects of opioids and helps the person to breathe again.

The possibility of re-traumatization occurs when providers are not knowledgeable and skilled in these areas; therefore, we utilized the Strategic Prevention Framework to identify the EBPs best suited to our community. The selected EBPs remove the fear and hesitation from starting conversations about behavioral health and opioid use disorders by improving understanding and providing an action plan that teaches people to safely and responsibly identify and address a potential mental illness or substance use disorder. When more people are equipped with the tools needed to start a dialogue, they can better identify resources and support, allowing more people to get the help they need. Because of the outcomes from our needs assessment, we will continue to prevent opioid use disorders, and plan to implement the two community awareness events with REVIVE! training as evidence-based strategies according to the abatement guidelines.
