Henrico County maintains an Addiction Task Force (ATF) tasked with county projects designed to impact the community with substance abuse driven issues. The ATF has recently expanded its committee structure to include a committee focused on OAA and other grant funding sources. A number of local organization (NGO's as well as health care organizations are in contact with the ATF with idea proposals. The ATF is in the process of vetting these conversations as well as other ideas to develop a robust usage for the Direct Distributions. In the Coutny's budget for FY 2024, \$295,498 was allotted from OAA direct Distributions to fill 3 positions: a Director of Substance Use and Disorder Services embedded with Henrico Area Mental Health and Developmental Services, and two peer specialists embedded with the Henrico Sheriff's office to connect inmates with substance use disorder with resources upon their exit from jail.

How long has the project existed? Provide a brief narrative description of the proposed project. Henrico County has been dedicated to collaboratively addressing substance use disorders and reducing overdoses in our community for many years. in 2017, our county manager, John Vithoulkas, developed our Heroin Task Force whcih later changed to the Addiction Task Force. In 2019, the Henrico County Board of Supervisors sponsored a Recovery Roundtable. This group was comprised of public and private entities coming together to address substance misuse in our community. The work of the group culminated with a number of recommendations made. Many of these recommendations were to be funded and implemented in 2020 weh nthe COVID pandemic caused the county to pivot to meet the crisis at hand.

Since 2017, Henrico Area Mental Health & Developmental Services (HAMHDS) has sought grant funding to support expansion of our substance use services and to implement as many of the Recovery

Roundtable recommendations as possible. As a result, HAMHDS was able to secure funding for positions through grant funding. Currently, grant funding is provided by the State Opioid Response (SOR) grant administered by the Department of Rehavioral Health and Developmental Services. The

f. Describe the objectives of this project

The objective of this request/project is to continue the work started with the SOR funded positions of which there are three programs. The substance use diversion positions seek to identify and assess clients who are held in jail on a pre-trial basis whose substance use disorder was related to their alleged crime. Those inmates with violent criminal history, sex offenses and/or drug distribution charges are ineligible for this program. All inmates selected for this program must be in the appropriate stage of change and not have outstanding charges in other jurisdictions. These individuals can and do benefit from intensive treatment. Substance Use Diversion clients receive thorough assessment, substance use case management, medication assisted treatment, treatment for co-occurring mental health diagnoses, group and individual therapy, frequent drug screening, peer support and overall wrap around services. Since January 2022, 23 individuals have participated in the diversion program. 14 participants have successfully graduated from the program since that time. 4 of the 14 individuals who have successfully participated in the program had healthy babies born thus preventing foster care placement. In addition, all of those who successfully participated in the program obtained employment.

g. How was the need determined and how does that need relate to abatement?

The need for this program/project was determined through consultation with community members, research, overdose data and mapping, local jail statistics, peer reports and request for services as well as general population demographics and Census results for Henrico County. The Henrico Addiction Task Force and the Recovery Roundtable studied the gaps in services and determined that SUD Jail Diversion, increased access to Medication Assisted Treatment, and an increased response to the overdose crisis in our community were top priorities. Henrico County sought funds to help provide needed resources. All of these efforts have directly and positively impacted those that have an opiate use disorder.

	Henrico Area Mental Health and Developmental Services provides supervision and oversight for the SUD Jail Diversion Program and Staff. In addition, HAMHDS contracts directly with a medical provider for part time medication assisted treatment. Within this relationship, the plan is to expand patient access by six hours a week. Moreover, HAMHDS is currently utilizing non grant funding for a second part time prescriber for Medication Assisted Treatment.
	HAMHDS is a part of the overall Henrico County government. Both HAMHDS and the Henrico Government will have oversight responsibilities for the provision of services provided through these funds.
i.	Who are the targeted beneficiaries, and how many persons are expected to participate per year?
	The beneficiaries of the services provided include the individual citizen who struggles with substance use disorder, their children, families, and the greater Henrico community. When an individual is able to gain recovery and become a productive, positively participating member of society, the positive ripple effects are felt throughout the community. Individuals in recovery are better able to parent their children, sustain gainful employment, avoid the legal system, and move to address the environmental and social factors that contribute to generational substance use. The local community experiences a decrease in requests for emergency assistance for housing and other costly social services benefits. Children can remain in their families and avoid foster care placements, emergency room visits decline, stability of the workforce increases and localities can direct funding to programming and infrastructure that enhances the quality of life for all citizens. It is anticipated that the MAT prescriber can serve a minimum of 70 people per year.
